SUNDAYS IN JUNE

June 7 - Graduation Sunday

We desire to honor graduates of High School this spring of 1964, al so college graduates. Graduates are requested to inform the office and then to meet prior to the 10:15 a.m. service and march into the service as a group. They will be honored after the morning message.

The message at both services, at 7:45 and 10:15 a.m. will be entitled, "Paid For" The Sacrament of Holy Communion will be an integral part of both services.

June 14 - Church School Sunday

The 10:15 a.m. service will be given over to a presentation, "Gods Garden," by members of our Church School. This day, formerly known as Children's Day will feature this very lovely presentation in the san ctuary, also a brief sermon for the children by the pastor. All members of the Church School are urged to remain for this service. The 8 a.m. preaching service brings a message by the pastor on "Beware of What You Believe."

June 21 - Father's Day

We as families desire to honor our father, as we did mother a few Sundays ago. In both services we highlight this occasion by the mess age on the subject "As He Had Done Previously."

June 28 - Nature Sunday "Where Do The Weeds Come From?" is the sermon topic for this day.

THE COUNCIL AT WORK

The Church Council is a body of 12 men elected by the people of the congregation to carry on the business, both spiritual as well as mun dane, of the church through the months of the year. This Council meets each month in official session wherein the reports of the com mittees of Council are heard and acted upon, and the life of the con gregation furthered. Each Council member is a member of one or more of about a dozen stated committees under which the life of the church is studied and furthered. These committees have specific responsibilities according to the church Constitution.

Under this Constitution, the Spir itual Committee and the Council at large has the responsibility of keeping the membership roll in a currently correct state as regards active and inactive membership. Why is this necessary? Because each year we must give to our denomination a statistical review of our congregation, stipulating such items as baptisms, marriages, deaths; the number who became members by Junior Confirmation or adult pro-fession and the number whose names have been subtracted from the roll because of death, loss of interest, removal to a new address with no in dication given the church as to location, etc. On the basis of the current membership figure supplied, the denomination bases its askings of our congregation as regards the matter of World Service, the support of Potomac Synod and the church at large, known as the Apportionment. Taken collectively this amounts to about \$13.00 asking per member per year for these amounts which are sent outside our local church and which we have moral obligations to meet as near 100% as we can. Putting it in a lump sum, our total benevo-lence budget totals about \$13000.00 for the year on the basis of approx imately 1000 members.

The Council, in its suggestion to the Pastor that this explanation be given, also requested a further explanation of procedures in working on the membership rolls, which it is required to do by our constitution. Each person on our membership roll is studied in a three-fold manner, the three obligations of membership - attendance at the services of wor ship for those physically able to so do, participation in the Sacrament in a consistent manner and sup port of the church through envelope giving. The Council's desire is that all members maintain their membership in a current active status.

If it is found that the membership is not active, then one of two procedures follow - a) our lay visitor, Mr. Wm. Laukeman, calls at the home to speak with the individual about the duties of membership or, b) if the inactivity has been of long duration, and is severe, a letter is sent the individual requesting some decision about the membership.

Only when the person indicates no interest in the church, either personally or by mail, or when there is persistent non-activity shown across a number of years, only then is that name "deleted" or tak en from the rolls.

Another procedure needs to be ex plained. If a person's membership is in an inactive status and the in dividual requests a "letter of tran sfer" to another church, this "letter" cannot be given because only active membership can be transferred. In such a case only a "letter of commendation" can be sent the other church, stating that membership was here but that it has been inactive.

The membership rolls have not been heretofore studied for many, many years. Since the new Constitution became effective with its de finite procedures, this study, now under way, is uncovering some individuals who have been inactive for years and who are now being challeng ed to activate their membership, or whose name is removed (deleted).
